Following the action of the **NCA** at the convention in Pittsburgh, I am enclosing herewith my check for five dollars for membership, together with my application which I trust you will find in order.

This morning, on looking over the October issue of the *Chiropractic Journal*, I find several things upon which I wish to offer what I would call constructive criticism and I trust you will accept it as such.

On Page 4, the first two editorial articles are unquestionably a tirade against the Palmer School and B.J. Palmer. You know, Doctor Rogers, you are trying to unite Chiropractors throughout the country regardless of what school they graduated from and such editorial articles as this certainly is not helping the policy of the NCA. (I, personally, am a graduate of the Palmer School of February, 1914). I certainly do not agree with Doctor Palmer on many things, but I do not feel that the statements in your editorial article are at all elevating to the science of Chiropractic; and you nor anyone else can deny that B.J. Palmer has done as much, if not more for Chiropractic, than any man living today; and I certainly do hope that in your efforts to unite the Chiropractic profession, you will take into consideration the fact that there are as many, if not more, Palmer School graduates in the United States today as there are graduates from all other schools put together; and that in the future you will use at least a little discretion in writing editorial articles.

In reference to the number attending either the NCA convention in Denver of Pittsburgh, or those attending at Davenport, naturally there are conflicting statements, but why bring this up? It does absolutely no good and certainly cannot help but do a great deal of harm as it has a tendency to create still more unrest in the Chiropractic profession.

I had been in hopes that after the Pittsburgh convention which I attended and was very much pleased to meet you personally, that let of this useless talk would be left aside and that you would go in for things really worth while in a big way. Who cares how many attended Davenport, Pittsburgh or Denver?

Then, under the heading "Voice of the Profession" on Page 16, under the sub-heading "A Basic Technician's report," you have what is purported to be a letter written in by one boasting **Logan's Basic Technique**. Now, I do not have any quarrel with anyone wishing to use **Logan's** BT or anything else, but it seems to me that -- as you are trying to unite the profession -- why not write up an article giving facts on the so-called Hole-In-One method of adjustment and the use of the **Neurocalometer**. It seems to me this would be only fair play, and particularly in view of the fact that the **NCA** is looking for new members and that the **Chiropractic Journal** is looking for new subscribers, that a few articles on the Hole-In-One, as stated above, or on Spinal Balance as taught at the **UCC** by Dr. **Steinbach**, or Dr. **DeJarnette's**

Sacro-Occipital Technique, would have a tendency to increase your subscriptions and membership of the NCA: Because, you know as well as I that Chiropractors using these methods are naturally interested in different phases of Chiropractic and are naturally going to subscribe to periodicals publishing articles on the subject or brach of Chiropractic that they are particularly interested in.

I appreciate the fact that in order to make the Journal selfsustaining, it is necessary to procure considerable advertising; but I certainly do not feel that it is necessary to run Kolar's stuff on Page 25 and Logan's stuff on Page 29 as "Special". Why not mark this stuff advertising? It really is and you know it as well as I. No doubt you will recall, I brought this to your attention in Pittsburgh and upon talking to numerous persons at Pittsburgh I found that everyone spoken to was of the same opinion as myself in this regard. I do not know what, if any obligation the NCA is under to these two gentlement but it seems to me that the NCA should be bigger than any one or two people or any clique of people and should be an organization for the good of Chiropractors throughout the country. I assure you that had there been more of a clean-cut open and above-board policy during the past few years, many other Chiropractors (myself included) would have become members long before this time.

This letter is rather long and no doubt somewhat rambling but I cannot refrain from expressing my opinion on the above subjects and I trust you will accept it in the same spirit in which it is written.

1932 (Oct 18): letter to CS Cleveland from James E. Slocum DC at Webster City IA, president of the ICC, who discusses scope of adjusting (i.e., adjusting extremities in addition to the spine) (Cleveland papers, CCC/KC):

Dear Doctor:-

I just receive a letter from Doctor Spears telling me that it will be impossible for him to be with us in Denver. This eliminates your "foot technique" worry.

Incidentally, Dr. Cleveland, I am committed to the thought that "foot technique" or any adjustic technique on any other articulation of the human body is just as much chiropractic as anything you can say, teach or do about the back-bone. I am a chiropractor when it comes to practice by hand only, but for the past eight or ten years, I have practiced a correction of any articulation in the human body that is subluxated. Granted without further argument that my practice is at least eighty per cent of the time on the spine, but just the same when there are subluxations in other articulations that inhibit the flow of nerve energy, I am going to take care of them and before my own reasoning power and comprehension, I am just as much of a chiropractor, and perhaps more so than one who fails to do that duty.

Don't misunderstand me. I am not trying to be mean or sarcastic, but I am telling you that the above is the kind of chiropractic that was PRACTICED, EMPHASIZED, and TAUGHT by the MAN WHO DISCOVERED this wonderful principle. From the day B.J. Palmer took hold of the reign down unto this moment, he has sought in every possible way to constrict and limit the chiorpractors field and the marvelous principle discovered by his father.

Sometime ago I indicated my attitude in a letter to Dr. Julander who was making an honest effort to get me behind B.J. and his program by the following statement:- "You have developed chiropractic along the fundamentals emphasized by B.J. Palmer and you are satisfied. You are a chiropractor and should be proud of that fact. I have developed chiropractic along the lines and fundamentals pronounced by D.D. Palmer and I am a chiropractor

just as much as you are and I am proud of the fact." While the above is not entirely applicable to you, yet in the sense that you have confined your teaching, research work, investigation and practice ENTIRELY to the spine, it does apply. B.J. has further limited this principle to three vertebrae of the upper cervicals. They are to be adjusted just once in the while. Will the schools and profession follow? I doubt it?

You know, Dr. Cleveland, it has fallen to my lot to try to mold the thought of the chiropractic profession and teach them what D.D. Palmer really thought chiropractic to be. I have put on many lectures on this question all over the country. It was this subject that the boys at the Lincoln College insisted on my appearing before their home-coming to present. I should like to have the opportunity some day of going into the books and records and showing you that the concept of vertebral subluxation is not the fundamental principle of chiropractic as taught and discovered by D.D. Palmer. If you could see, during corn-shucking time for instance, the number of men that come into this office who do not need an adjustment on the spine, but shoulders, elbows and hands, and they walk out of here many times well right then, I am sure you would be surprised.

I think I have said enought in this letter to place myself before you clearly, not as an opinion but as a matter of absolute conviction. I think you and I understand each other well enough that we know we can go to the mat and thrash this proposition out and make a decision on the basis of which one of us hold in his possession the facts. This I would be very pleased to do. I have made the attempt several times to get B.J. to debate this question and he will not do it now nor never and when you take a look at the facts, you will understand the reasons why. I trust that at some future date we will be able to discuss this question from every angle and arrive at a mutual conclusion. I think it well that our leaders in the profession understand each other and have a clear concept of what our fundamentals are that they may be guided into the right channels on research work.

Now as to your statement concerning a cataract operation, or foot adjustments, or anything of the kind, remember this first:-You are chairman of the program committee. I appointed you to that position because I have confidence in you and I know that you are enthusiastic and will go the limit to do the right thing. Because my authority might supercede your's is no reason why I would be inclined to so exercise it. If you think it is wrong to follow some of the suggestions I have made, then we are not going to do it. Dr. Kolar does not want to put on the operaton anyway. Speaking of Dr. Kolar, I want to present this thought, i.e.- he does not have anything for sale and it was going to be purely a demonstration from the angle of helping us draw a larger attendance. I believe that is the reason why you wanted B. McFadden and Tilden, neither of which are chiropractors. They possibly would put on demonstrations before they had finished that would not be chiropractic. For your further information, Dr. Hender made the statement at the conclusion of Dr. Kolar 's lecture in Des Moines, which covered a period of two hours, that it was one of the finest chiropractic lectures he had ever heard since he had been in the profession.

I think it will be well that you continue him on the program on neurology as he knows it like no other man in the chiropractic profession. What he knows about it is much the consequence of his own research. Dr. Hull of Des Moines made the observation that Dr. Kolar gave every chiropractor at least fifty dollars worth of information if he had brains enough to appreciate it. I think this is sufficient on this part of the discussion.

It has been impossible to find time to write the Johnson twins, but we are going to do so today. Just as soon as I hear from them I shall let you know.

I do not have your recent letter before me right now so if I have passed up something in replying to it I will write you at a

later date.

I was glad to find a few minutes to talk with you the other evening. I have gotten many inquiries concerning the fee to be charged. I think we should announce that fact in the next issue of the JOURNAL. If there is any way that I can help you out, please let me know.

1932: according to Metz (1965, p. 57):

In 1933, it was voted to pay half the expenses of two delegates from the K.C.A. to the Denver convention of the new N.C.A. AT the previous year's convention of N.C.A. in Wichita, a new approach to health problems was demonstrated by Dr. Francis Kolar. He came from California to establish a clinic with several local chiropractors, Drs. Fred Good and Clarence Richter as assistants, and later, Dr. Keith Surtees, also, besides a large number of women assistants or nurses. This Clinic was located in the Kersting Hotel, at 320 N. Market St. His records indicated that patients came from every state in the Union and some foreign countries.

Because the Kansas law permitted the replacement of any body tissues, he did not restrict his work to the spine. He had studied under a Viennese Orthopedist, in Europe, to care for stubborn cases. Through the use of special lenses over the patient's eyes, he directed a beam of light through them to effect the thalamus, a sensory switchboard of the brain. This means was used to replace the anesthetics of the medical profession in surgery, by which means his "bloodless surgery" was done by hands only, to remove tumors, goiters, adhesions, cysts and replace prolapsed organs, and no pain was felt. He permitted as many chiropractors at the convention as could get into the room to see such an operation. He was also on K.C.A. convention programs to explain his work, in 1933 and 1934. Then in 137, he was appointed to the State Examining Board for a three year term. In 1942, he returned to California to practice at Laurel Canyon Sanitarium 'till 1959.

LEGAL NOTES

Anna Wardell, executrix of the estate of Hugh Wardell, deceased, has brought suit against the Kolar Health Clinic of Wichita, Kansas, demanding \$10,500.

An investigation of the case shows that Hugh Wardell had allowed a physician and surgeon to make an exploratory operation on him some seventeen years ago. Wardell had been trying to find relief from that time on. As a last resort, he went to Dr. Kolar. Under Dr. Kolar's care, an immediate improvement was noticeable. But against the wishes of Dr. Kolar, Wardell left the clinic for his home some considerable distance away, and thereafter suffered a relapse. Undoubtedly whatever trouble Mr.

Wardell had was the result of the exploratory operation performed on him seventeen years ago. But with the characteristic subtleness, some physician and surgeon evidently advised Mrs. Wardell that Chiropractic was to blame for Wardell's death, and a malpractice suit followed.

Dear Vint and Peggy:

Received your letter this morning; glad you enjoyed he drive around the lake front. I sent you fourth letter yesterday since leaving Kansas City. Am now convinced that the negro porter on the chair car did not mail the letter I wrote you in longhand.

I finally and definitely decided to take about six weeks vacation as soon as we can have a conference concerning certain matters, professional and social, and as soon as we can exchange cars; for I am going a long, long ways and I am sure you will feel better if I have my own car.

We had a wonderful banquet here last night, about 38 present. Dr. Huey prepared some musical numbers and lead in community singing. They formed a Kansas state division of the **International Chiropractic Research Foundation**, and everyone evidenced marked appreciation for the treat we afforded them in that we defrayed the bills for the banquet and music, etc. \$28.50 for the dinners, \$3.00 tips, \$3.00 for the music, \$6.00 for the banquet picture will make a total of \$40.5 that you may charge against the fund

The charter officers elected by the Kansas division were J.F. Fallot of Wichita, President; Dr. John Gabriel of Topeka, Vice President; Dr. W.W Beck of Parson, Secretary-Treasurer.

Any reference to Basic Technique or myself seems to have been carefully deleted from the publicity, something I have been accustomed to long since. Some of the blue noses that were too cheap to get in on the course or who, perhaps, we disappointed by not giving them the course, are attempting to retaliate. Have not determined exactly who, but feel that **Kolar** might be one of the malcontents.

Kolar had something in his publication about Willard Carver's claim that he had organized Basic Technique. Wile Dr. Huey is inclined to exonerate **Kolar**, it is my contention that Carver's claim, without publication, would not be injurious.

The convention opened this morning; I was not present, but will drop in to their business session this afternoon. As you know, I am a member of their state association...




