Dear Doctor Palmer:

If this suggestion meets with your approval, I submit this as a challenge in so far as I can take it upon myself to speak for the others that will be concerned.

We, the members of the 1917 PSC baseball team, challenge the present PSC baseball team to a game to be played during Lyceum on such a date as you will see fit. I further suggest that this game be played in the evening, beginning about five-thirty or six o'clock, at the III park, so that all in attendance at the Lyceum may attend the game; and a general admission price be charged, the money taken in be turned over to The PSC for the encouraging of athletics.

Trusting that this will meet with your approval and that you will lend us your support to help put this across, I am, Sincerely yours, J.E. Slocum, D.C.

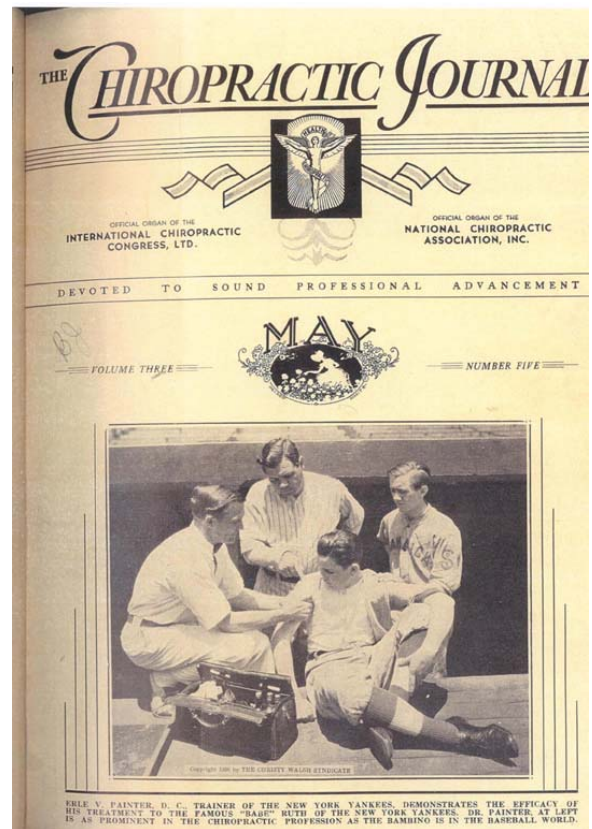

Dear Doctor:

On December 17, 1937, I attended the third series of the Naismith League basketball games. Near the end of the game between your team and the Phillips 66, the right lense of my glasses was broken by Murray Brown.

When this happened I was sitting in the second row behind the Phillips 66 team. This misfortune occurred when a substitute was sent in for Murray Brown, who instead of going to the bench went into the stands to shake hands with some individual who was kidding him. Immediately after the game I asked Murray if he would help me to replace the lense. However, he said he was going to school and was not in a position to help me.

The cost to replace the lense was \$2.75. Although this is not a large amount, I believe if Murray understood my circumstances he would help me as much as he could.

I appreciate your kindness in this matter and hope that in some way Murray Brown will be able to reimburse me. Sincerely yours,...

DR. RICHTER PASSES AWAY

Dr. B.R. Richter, 54, of Freeport, Pennsylvania, passed away in the Allegheny Valley Hospital on July 17. He had been in failing health for some months and suffered a stroke in his home, and was at once removed to the hospital where he died a few hours later.

Dr. Richter was a bone and muscle authority of international repute. In the late thirties, he was called to England to treat the Duke of Windsor for injuries received in a fall from a horse. He also treated many professional baseball and football stars and boxing, collegiate football and basketball players and amateurs in all lines of sport.

Dr. Richter was born in Grafton, West Virginia, and became a resident at Greenville, Pennsylvania, at an early age. He was graduated from the Universal Chiropractic College a Davenport, Iowa, and took special studies at Duquesne University.

He served with the American forces during World War I, and resumed his practice in Freeport upon his release from the service.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Iola Richter, he leaves a step-daughter, Mrs. Roger Ruppertsberger, of Freeport, and a step-granddaughter, Carol Ruppertsberger, and a host of friends throughout the country who mourned his death. - Reported by Dr. H.H. Ward, Cleveland, Ohio.

Peter L. Poulsen was born in Spanish Forks, Utah, on October 15, 1900, receiving his primary and secondary education there. He graduated from the Oregon Institute of Technology and studied pre-medical at the University of Oregon. He later enrolled at the Pacific Chiropractic College (now Western States College) in 1924, graduating with honors in the class of 1927. He returned to the Pacific College to study physiotherapy in 1928 receiving the degree of Doctor of Physical Therapy in 1929.

Dr. Poulsen took post-graduate work at the National College of Chiropractic in 1941 and again in 1949. He practiced his profession

in Portland from 1934 to 1939, when he moved to Baker, Oregon, where he has been in practice since.

Dr. Poulsen is past president of the Oregon Association of Chiropractic Physicians, NCA State Delegate from Oregon, vice-president of the National Council on Psychotherapy, and secretary of the National Council of NCA State Delegates.

His charming wife, Margaret, and their ten-year old son, Willard, are his enthusiastic companions at all state and national conventions. Mrs. Poulsen is now serving as president of the Baker branch of the American Association of University Women.

Dr. Poulsen is a 32° Mason in the Scottish Rite. He is also a trustee of the Bakers Elks lodge, past president of the Young Men's Council of the Commercial Club, past president of the Baker Chapter of American Red Cross, past president of the Baker Lions Club, president of the Baker Booster Club, and many other civic activities too numerous to mention.

He has acted as trainer for the athletic teams of Baker since 1939, and is also examining physician for the Boxing and Wrestling Commission.

We salute you, then, Dr. Poulsen, for the outstanding work you have done to benefit both your community and your profession. May your fine example of professional integrity prove an inspiration to other younger practitioners to follow in your footsteps.

DR. FOUTS APPOINTED TO B.S. BOARD

Dr. Lewis H. Fouts, of Lawton, Oklahoma, was recently appointed to the Oklahoma State Board of Basic Sciences Examiners. Dr. Fouts was graduated from the Lincoln Chiropractic College, Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1930. He was president of the Oklahoma Chiropractic Association in 1937. He has served on the Chiropractic Board of Examiners continuously since 1937. At present he is secretary of the board.

He was president of the Lawton Kiwanis club in 1947 and served as Lt. Governor of the Oklahoma-Texas district for 1950. At the annual convention in Oklahoma City, October 8, 1951, Dr. Fouts was elected governor of this district of the Kiwanis Club.

Dr. Fouts has served as chairman of the American Red Cross in Commanche County and has been athletic doctor for the Lawton High School and Cameron College for seventeen years.

Dr. Fouts served as NCA delegate from Oklahoma in 1941-42.

Dr. Harry Rainey Bybee, 61, a practicing chiropractor in Norfolk, Virginia, for 41 years, who gained national recognition as president of the National Chiropractic Association, died on April 4 at 9:05 p.m. at his residence, 730 Westover Avenue, after an illness of several weeks.

Dr. Bybee was born in Lancaster, Ohio, February 18, 1891, the son of the late Dr. Burt H. Bybee, also a chiropractor, and Mrs. Clara H. Bybee. He was the husband of Mrs. Lucile Perryman Bybee.

A graduate of Michigan College of Chiropractic, he began practice in Norfolk in 1911. He maintained offices in the New Monroe Building.

Besides heading the NCA, he was a past president of the All Southern States Association, a past president of the Tri-State Chiropractic Society, a past president of the Virginia Chiropractic Society, and was an official of the National Council of Chiropractic Roentgenologists.

Active in civic pursuits, he was a 32nd Degree Mason, a member of Khedive Shrine Temple; a Knight Templar; a past chancellor commander of the Knights of Pythias, and a member of the Cavalier Yacht and Country Club. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

While president of the National Chiropractic Association, he was presented the key to the capital city in Washington by Representative Harold Louvre.

Among his outstanding clientele were Billy Sunday, Gen. John J. Pershing, Frank Sinatra, Billy Southworth, and more lately Phil Rizzuto, Yankee short-stop, and Al Jolson.

Besides his wife, surviving are one son, Dr. Harry Rainey Bybee, Jr., of Norfolk; two daughters, Mrs. W.S. Portlock, Jr., of Ingleside, Norfolk County, and Mrs. Stanley V. Puidokas, of Virginia Beach; two granddaughters, Lucile B. Portlock and Roberta Bybee; two grandsons, W.S. Portlock, III, and Harry R. Bybee, II; and one brother, Dr. R.V. Bybee, of Richmond.

The body was removed to the Cox Funeral Home, where funeral services will be conducted Monday at an hour to be announced, by the Rev. R. Stuart Grizzard, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial will be in Forest Lawn Cemetery. – Taken from Norfolk Virginian-Pilot, Saturday, April 5, 1952.

DR. NEMITZ PASSES AWAY

Dr. Gustav Frederick Nemitz, sixty-four, of Fort Worth, a prominent figure in Texas chiropractic affairs, died April 2 in a Fort Worth hospital after an illness of four months. He suffered a heart attack last November.

Dr. Nemitz was a trainer for the Detroit Tigers, American Legion baseball team, from 1940 to 1944, and was chairman of the athletic injuries panel discussion that proved so popular at the Fort Worth convention in the spring of 1951.

His death came, incidentally, only a few weeks after the passing of Alvin "Bo" McMillan, the college and professional football coach, who was the headline performer at the panel discussion.

Dr. Nemitz came to the U.S. from Germany when he was eighteen years old. He lived in Fort Worth in 1920, and was an active practitioner until his health failed last November.

Survivors include his son, Dr. F.C. Nemitz, and two sisters, who live in Germany.

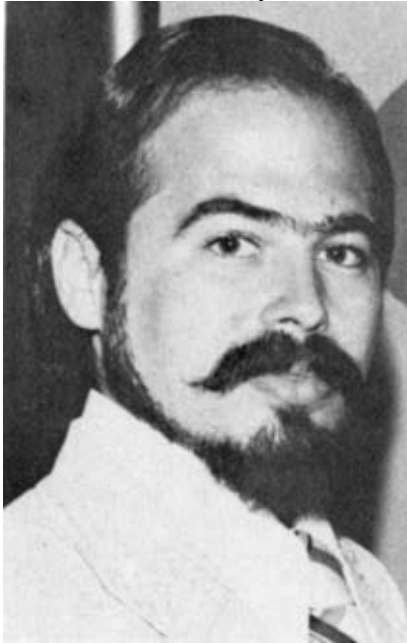

Sports Injury Course Concludes in Mexico City

Logan College's 100-hour course on Sports Injuries, given in Mexico City in three sessions during the fall of 1989, was completed in early December. The course attended by some 21 students, mostly from Latin America, was taught by instructors from several chiropractic colleges.

The final session was taught by Drs. Marianne Gengenbach of Logan College and Philip Santiago of New York Chiropractic College. Both are members of the Academy of Chiropractic Sports Physicians and they also represented the academy at the conclusion of the course when they administered the examination for certification as Certified Chiropractic Sports Physicians.
